- * Medication reminders
- * Bathing assistance
- * Dressing assistance
- * Meals
- * Activities

Memory Care

Best for:

- * Alzheimer's disease
- * Dementia
- * Wandering behaviors
- * Increased supervision needs

Includes:

- * Secure environments
- * Dementia-trained staff
- * Structured programming
- * Enhanced supervision

Skilled Nursing

Best for:

- * Complex medical needs
- * Rehabilitation
- * 24-hour nursing care

Chapter 3: What Does Senior Living Cost in Philadelphia?

Estimated Monthly Ranges

Independent Living

\$3,000 – \$6,000+

Assisted Living

\$5,500 – \$8,500+

Memory Care

\$6,500 – \$10,000+

Skilled Nursing

\$10,000 – \$13,000+

6. Are residents engaged and active?
7. Do staff appear caring and attentive?
8. Would I feel comfortable living here myself?

What to Look For on a Tour

When you're touring communities, here are the things to pay attention to that most people miss:

The staff's body language. Are caregivers smiling and engaged, or do they look exhausted and distracted? Do they greet residents by name? A community's culture is written on the faces of its staff.

The smell. It sounds basic, yet it matters enormously. A well-maintained community should smell clean, not like air freshener covering up something else. If you walk in and your nose tells you something is wrong, trust it!

The activity calendar. Ask to see it. Is it full of varied, thoughtful programming? Or is it the same three things repeated? A robust activity calendar tells you the community invests in residents' quality of life.

Resident engagement. Are people in common areas talking,

playing cards, doing activities? Or are they parked in front of a television? A community that keeps residents active and social is doing its job.

The dining room. If you can, tour during a meal. The quality of food and the dining experience are daily realities for residents. A community that cuts corners on food is probably cutting corners elsewhere.
